"Philippines Orchid Gathering Trip" Bill Thoms

Bill's presentation is about his 6 weeks of hunting orchids (primarily Bulbos) in the Philippines. The presentation offers lots of slides covering the people, the culture and the environment.

Bill Thoms got his first orchid in 1969 when he rescued plants of *Encyclia tampensis* in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. (He actually just picked them off trees pushed over for a new condo, but it sounds better). After moving to the Tampa area in the early '70s and, after having a retail orchid nursery for 30 years called Hilltop House, he and his wife, Doris Dukes, (whom he met at a local Orchid Club in the early '80s), took several thousand of their favorite plants and built their own greenhouse at home to retire from the retail

business, relax and continue their hybridizing program. Since then they have moved twice and now live back near Brandon and the awards have grown to: 98 Awards for Culture in over 30 genera including 44 in the bulbophyllum alliance and 18 Certificates for Cultural Excellence (90 points or better); First Class Certificates for Bulbophyllums, Cattleyas, Paphiopedilums and Phragmipediums; and over 300 total awards in all categories. Bill also received one of the most prestigious awards given to a hybridizer, an Award of Distinction which is given for a worthy new avenue of breeding. The American Orchid Society has added a new Annual Award for the Bulbophyllums, the Bill Thoms Award.

Bill gives talks nationally and internationally on a wide range of topics ranging from his specialty, "Bulbophyllums," to "General Orchid Culture" which is a favorite of most new growers. They all are presented in a funny style that helps growers understand how the plants work and they all revolve around the culture of orchids. He helps the beginner grower with lots of advice about fixing problems and has a wealth of accumulated information for the more advanced grower, too!

No matter whether you have 1000s of orchids, just a few, or none at all, Bill will give you tips to make any plants grow and bloom better.

Many people say he is one of the best speakers they have ever heard. Come and see for yourself. He has published a new book, <u>Bulbophyllums</u>; the <u>Incomplete Guide</u>, <u>From A to WHY?</u> (\$44.95), which you may purchase from him. It also comes as a CD (\$19.95) for use on a computer. The book will be discounted for the members and guests!!

LET'S TALK ORCHIDS

The lazy days of summer are here -- high temperatures, lots of showers and humidity. Orchids are responding and growing quickly. With all the rain we've had in July it's important to check for fungal problems. I sprayed with Banrot (1 tbsp. per gal. of water, plus 1/2 tsp. of Ivory dish soap per gal. of water) as a preventative measure. As with any fungicides and insecticides, use protective clothing and follow manufacturers' directions. Our library has the AOS Handbook on Orchid Pests and Diseases. This is a great reference for orchid problems.

Here's an example of not following my own advice of using slug and snail bait more frequently during the multiple, early July rains. A beautiful cattleya hybrid opened with small nibbles on its large, frilly petals. Rats! A slug ruined two lovely bicolored flowers. It only takes a few minutes to prevent orchid disasters like this. At least the blooms still emit a wonderful fragrance.

Many of my phalaenopsis orchids have been in bloom since April, but with the hot days of July they are losing their flowers quickly (no AC in the greenhouse). This means repotting time for them. This blooming season has been one of the best I can remember. I'll miss their colorful spikes. Phalaenopsis can be repotted almost any time, but I find summer to be the best for me. Repotting seems to give them an extra boost. Maybe that's because I add fresh Nutricote (Dynamite) fertilizer pellets to top dress their pots.

Vandas have loved the extra heat, humidity and rain. My terete hybrid Vandaenopsis Mecca's Candy 'Sweet Tooth' has several spikes of lovely pink flowers, as does another no name hybrid. My Rumrillara (Ascocentrum x Neofinetia x Rhynchostylis) has spikes of small light pink flowers. The Neofinetia influence is quite apparent both in the size of the plant and the flower shape.

July and August are also premier months for Miltonias, Miltassias, and a number of Oncidiums. Many of these warm growers are sending up spikes now: Miltassia Darth Vader 'Dark Star' (deep purple), Miltassia Olmec 'Kano' (pink/mahogany), Miltassia Amazon Queen (yellow/mahogany) and Degarmorara Flying High 'Stars and Bars' (yellow/mahogany). I can't wait for Miltonia spectabilis and its hybrids to flower in August!

Other orchids in bloom include C. Roman Candle (purple), Blc. Keowee 'Newberry' (yellow/red speckles in wide lip), Slc. Wendy's 'Redstone' (red), Eplc. May Bly (chartreuse/deep pink lip), Phal. equestris (cream/ purple lip), and Paph. sukhakulii (green/black spots on petals/ reddish brown pouch).

Enjoy the summer and have fun with your orchids. Hope to see you at the meeting.
